## Alzheimer's WA welcomes two new Board members

Chair of Alzheimer's WA, Craig Masarei and CEO Rhonda Parker are delighted to announce the appointment of two new Board directors for 2019, Mr Warren Harding and Mr Matthew Budge.

Chair Mr Craig Masarei said both appointees bring with them a wealth of knowledge as well as a reliable voice for those with dementia and their carers.

"Mr Harding has been the Minister for Health's nominee on the current state-wide Sustainable Health Review, holds an Adjunct Professorship at Curtin Business School and brings over 30 years of international strategic management consulting and other NFP board experience to the role," Mr Masarei said.

"He was also former Vice President and Chair of the Nominations Committee for Tennis West from 2012-18."

Mr Harding recently experienced the passing of his mother who lived with dementia for 11 years and is very passionate about raising awareness; driving increased wellness for carers and people living with dementia; use of assistive technology; and better training in aged care.

Mr Masarei said the Board was also excited by the appointment of Matthew Budge, a Partner at PwC

"Mr Budge brings with him more 18 years' experience and is the trusted tax adviser to some of WA's largest companies and wealthiest families," he said.

"Like Warren, Matthew has also been touched by the dementia journey. His Mother has Younger Onset Dementia and Matt says a role with Alzheimer's WA gives him a tangible way to help others.

"His contribution was significant and outstanding. In 2018, he raised close to \$10,000 through our Chocolate Block Challenge. In September, together with PwC, Matt raised \$3,500 after hosting our inaugural World Alzheimer's Day Cocktail party, attended by Deputy Premier, Hon Roger Cook MLA.

- There are currently 41,149 people living with dementia in Western Australia.
- This figure is predicted to increase dramatically to over 84,000 people in less than twenty years and almost 150,000 people by 2056<sup>1</sup>.
- Dementia is the leading cause of death of women in Australia, and the second leading cause of death of all Australians<sup>2</sup>. There is currently no cure.
